National Forum Student Associate Internship in partnership with the Union of Students in Ireland

The National Forum for the Enhancement of Teaching and Learning in Higher Education, in partnership with the Union of Students in Ireland (USI), is currently looking to recruit a full-time, paid Student Associate Intern for 2020/2021. This 12-month internship will be from 1 July 2020 – 30 June 2021. However, the National Forum will aim to be as flexible as possible in relation to official start and finish dates.

This is a full-time position, involving 37 hours per week, with a salary of circa €26k.

The National Forum is based in Dublin and there may be a need to travel regularly within Ireland for meetings, updates and institutional visits. It may be possible for the incumbent to work from their existing location but they will be required in the National Forum offices, c/o 19 Dawson Street, Dublin 2 for at least two days per week. Travel and remote working arrangements can be discussed upon appointment. All travel associated with the internship will be covered by the National Forum. The National Forum will aim to be as flexible as possible in relation to working arrangements.

The Student Associate Intern will help to enhance and develop a partnership approach to ensure that students continue to play a central role in shaping the future landscape of teaching and learning in Irish higher education.

This is an excellent opportunity for the right candidate to expand their understanding of teaching and learning enhancement in Irish higher education and the direct impact its future development will have on students and the student experience. Working alongside the rest of the National Forum team, USI, student representatives and other sector bodies, the successful applicant will play a key role in enhancing student engagement within the National Forum's work and communications.

The Role

This internship will be of interest to those with a keen interest in teaching and learning enhancement and the successful candidate should be familiar with the work of the National Forum.

The role will involve working with the National Forum team to support and guide the achievement of the National Forum strategic objectives 2019-2021, including playing a key role in:

- consulting with students to ensure that the National Forum strategy builds on a strong evidence base. This may be carried out through institution visits, focus groups and liaising with Students' Unions.
- championing initiatives that will support teaching and learning enhancement from a student perspective.
- co-ordinating the National Forum's Student Panel, which will involve delegating reviews and events to its members.

- taking a lead role in reviewing and subsequently rolling out the student-led National Teaching Hero Awards, in partnership with USI and other Students' Unions
- liaising with USI and other Students' Unions, QQI, AHEAD and the HEA on agreed partnership activities.
- developing a communication plan to communicate the work of the National Forum to students.

Criteria

To be eligible to apply for this post the candidate must:

- be enrolled as a current student in an Irish Higher Education Institution (HEI) (undergraduate or postgraduate)
or
- be a recent graduate (within the last 12 months) of an Irish HEI
or
- have held a student representative role with the USI or other Students' Union within the last year.

The candidate should also aim to satisfy the following DESIRABLE criteria:

- A demonstrable strong interest in teaching and learning enhancement in Irish higher education.
- An excellent knowledge of the work of the National Forum
- An ability to commit to working fulltime with the National Forum and (if living outside Dublin) spending at least two days per week in the National Forum offices in Dublin (For those outside Dublin, travel costs will be paid by the National Forum.)
- Strong written and oral communication skills and the ability to communicate effectively with both students and management in higher education (Please note: written and presentation skills may be subject to a specific assessment as part of the selection process.)
- Good organisational skills and the ability to work on their own initiative
- Experience of research and research methods
- Demonstrable leadership skills
- The ability to work with a small dynamic team
